

Food Pantry: Unexpected Blessings

ur PCOP Pantry is thriving!
In recent months our pantry
clientele list has almost doubled.
The relationships we have formed with
social workers at Winston Campus and
Virginia Lake Elementary have
strengthened and grown as they have
come to trust that we will welcome and
respect the families they refer to us - that
we are a "safe place".

There are some things we didn't expect when the pantry was in the planning stages in 2020 or even as we have been in operation since November of that year. This school year, staff from Winston Jr. High have brought students to the pantry to shop and they are also the ones who were excited to deliver the 15 boxes of items the school had collected as donations to the pantry.

Their first trip to shop they were very tentative and quiet and took very few items. Now when they come, they seem to feel comfortable. They haven't been greedy; they just take enough items to get them through breakfast and lunch over a weekend or during spring break.



Whether their initial discomfort came from being in a church, being embarrassed, or just the newness of the experience, they have now relaxed and are open to receiving what we offer.

One of the new family clients we have is from Virginia Lake Elementary. The VL social worker shared with us that staff has been trying unsuccessfully to build a relationship all year with this family. With the offer of receiving food from the pantry, regular dialogue has been established and they are now able to offer the family services and assistance which benefit them.

Unexpected blessings - we never know in what ways our service to others will impact them.


